

- **4.** Users wear a headband with a sensor on the back, and another sensor on their arm. To move the chair forwards you dip your head, and to turn you rotate your arm. "It has given the students who can access it a different way of moving and changes how they control travelling and turning in dance," Gardiner tells BuzzFeed News.
- **5.** David Martin, network development manager at Remap, says the charity, which has only three full-time staff and relies on an extensive network of volunteers, helps a huge variety of people.
