#### Amazon.com

Amazon sells almost everything from CDs and software to household appliances. Full-size homes, cars, cigarettes, and live animals are the only things you have to leave your house to buy. Amazon is the third largest retailer in the world. But unlike the two largest stores, Amazon has neither produced a single product, nor built a single store. Amazon owns several companies under their own brands. For example, Shelfari is a social website. Its users build virtual bookshelves of the titles they have read and can rate, review, or create groups to discuss them. Amazon makes its money by taking a small percentage of the sale price of each item that is sold through its website. Amazon also allows companies to advertise their products by paying to be listed as products for sale.

That is today. But how did it start? In the summer of 1994, Jeff Bezos quit his job on Wall Street, moved to Texas with his wife and hired a car. While driving towards the Pacific Northwest, he sketched out a plan to set up Amazon.com. Later, in a suburb of Seattle, he set up an office in a garage. Bezos had a \$300,000 cheque. The money had been taken out of his father's retirement savings. Obviously, the investment didn't turn out too bad! Originally, Amazon was an online bookstore, and within a year its catalogue contained hundreds of thousands of different titles.

In Amazon's early days, a bell was rung every single time a new order was made through the site. As the company rapidly grew and new sales reached a peak, management had to stop this ritual as the bell was being rung so frequently.

Bezos never wanted to call his new site Amazon. His first choice was "Cadabra," as in the magician's phrase, "Abracadabra." But his lawyer convinced him that it sounded a bit frightening, and Bezos changed his mind. His second choice was "Relentless." Although it wasn't chosen either, Jeff Bezos liked the name enough to buy the domain name and now the website relentless.com redirects to Amazon.com. Eventually the founder picked Amazon.com because the Amazon is by far the biggest river in the world, and Bezos planned to make his store the biggest in the world. And apart from this, website listings used to be in alphabetical order.

Amazon's logo is a yellow arrow that looks like a smile from A to Z in the Amazon name. Originally, the smile design was meant to say "we're happy to deliver anywhere." But at an Amazon press conference a senior member of the staff explained that the smile indicated that Amazon did everything to provide for its customers' needs from A-Z.

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It took Amazon seven years to start making a lot of money. In 2005, it launched Amazon Prime, a paid subscription service, which offered quicker, free delivery to regular customers on about a million items. When the Prime service was introduced in New York, the company says one customer received an item in just 23 minutes. One in every 10 Americans—10.7% of the population —has an Amazon Prime membership. Pause for one second. Amazon just shipped 35 items in that period.

If all the cardboard boxes used in all 1.6 million daily Amazon packages were laid out, it would cover an area equivalent to 26,400 square miles—roughly the same size as the State of West Virginia or the country of Sri Lanka. Once it was calculated that the company could cover the entire United States in cardboard boxes in about five months of sales.
