Woman: Can I help you?

Girl: Yes, please. I'm looking for the accommodation officer. Do you know where she is?

Woman: I don't, I'm afraid. I can probably help you. My name is Joanna Swift. Do sit down.

Girl: Thank you. I'd like to move into a college room in October. Can you tell me a bit about what's available?

Woman: Certainly. We have two blocks for women students. The first is Ridgeway House. There are two types of room - an ordinary bedroom with desk, etc., which is \$230 a week, that's with food, of course, but not ensuite facilities, and then there's the bigger study bedroom, which is \$270 a week.

Girl: Mm. I think I'm more interested in the cheaper room. But are they very small?

Woman: Well, they're not very big, but there's a large common room with a TV on each floor, so there's somewhere to go and talk to friends or see the news. The university campus is a five- minute bus ride, or 20 if you walk.

Girl: Oh, that's not so far.

Woman: No, but there is something that you may find a problem - I'm afraid Ridgeway House is <u>closed in the summer</u>, but not the winter <u>vacation</u>.

Girl: Oh, that is a problem, actually. I need somewhere for the whole year.

Woman: Mm. International House may suit you better. It's much cheaper - only \$130 to share a room or \$150 for a single room. Food isn't included in the price, but there's a kitchen on every floor and washing machines on the ground floor.

Girl: That sounds better, but I wouldn't want to share. I'm such a tidy person, you know, I would find sharing difficult. I'd like to have a single room, if one is available.

Woman: There are a few singles still available for next year, but you'll have to make up your mind fairly soon, as it's such a popular hall. Why don't you go and take a look? The address is <u>27 Whitaker</u>, that's spelt <u>W-H-I-T-A-K-E-R</u> Place.

Girl: Yes, I'll do that.

Woman: There are also quite a few facilities you might be interested in. There's an outdoor swimming pool for the warmer months and <u>an all-weather volleyball court</u>.

Girl: I think I'm probably more interested in having access to a computer.

Woman: No problem - there's a computer room situated <u>in the basement</u>. It's run by volunteers and is always open in the evenings and at weekends. Now, I should tell you that there's really only one rule in International House, and that is that <u>no smoking is permitted anywhere on the premises</u>. They also have an unofficial policy of no noise after ten o'clock at night.

Girl: That won't be a problem. I will go and have a look and then come back. Would I need to pay a deposit today?

Woman: It would be better, and you also need to fill in the application form. The fee is \$25, which you pay now, with a further \$100 deposit when you get the key. I'm sure you'd enjoy living there - it's a lovely building and was only finished last year.

Girl: It sounds brilliant. Thank you very much for your help.
