Listening (Script)

Task 1. You will hear an announcement made by an electronic assistant about courses at a craft

centre. For each question, fill in the missing information in the numbered space. Write numerals

in numbers. You have 30 seconds to look at the task.

[pause 30 seconds]

Now we are ready to start. Listen carefully. You will hear the recording twice.

Electronic assistant: Welcome to the Grange Craft Center.

You will be given information about courses at the centre. There are courses in painting, pottery,

drawing and sculpture and each class lasts for 30 weeks - except sculpture, which is 33 weeks. All

classes are on weekday evenings, and each class lasts for an hour. Pottery and drawing are on

Mondays and Wednesdays, and painting and sculpture are on Tuesdays and Thursdays. At the end

of the year those students who take courses at our centre will have to be here at weekends to help

teachers to set up the end-of-year exhibitions. As well as the beginner courses, there are 2 other

courses - intermediate and advanced. In order to join the intermediate class, you need to have

completed the beginners class either here or at the nearby Salton Craft Centre, and in order to join

the advanced class, you need to have completed both the beginner and the intermediate class either

here or at the Salton Centre.

Now that you know which class to join, you need to know the times of the classes. There will be a

couple of changes this year. Instead of being from 5 to 6 o'clock, like last year, all beginners

classes will be from 6 to 7 pm. This means that intermediate classes will be from 5 to 6, and the

advanced class stays the same, from 8 to 9. Don't worry if you can't remember that. There is a

timetable and an enrolment form in your information pack. Please, return the form to us by the end

of the month, if you wish to take one of our courses.

This will help us to make sure we have enough equipment for everyone. That's about all. If you

need listening for one more time, press 1 [fade out]

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Task 2

You will hear an interview with a woman who has written a popular novel. For each question, choose the correct answer, A, B or C. You now have 45 seconds to look at the questions for part 2.

Now we are ready to start. Listen carefully. You will hear the recording twice.

I Today I'm talking to the writer, Anna Zayuna. Anna, did you always want to write?

AZ I wrote my first novel when I was thirteen . It was based on the life of a teacher. I even sent

it to a publisher, but they weren't interested. When I got to college, I didn't think I could make a living as a writer. So I trained as a nurse because I wanted to help people, and forgot about writing.

I What happened to change that?

AZ Well, I met my husband when I was 20. 1'd graduated and had my wedding within a few months of each other at the age of 22 and had the first of three children at 24, so my career was fairly interrupted. Later, when the children grew up a bit, I did a writing class as a hobby, and then got some work as a journalist as a result.

I How were you discovered?

AZ I wrote a short story and entered it for a competition on the Internet. I won second place and my story was published in a magazine. Then I was asked to read the story on the radio. An agent heard that, and asked me to develop the story into a novel. It took me three years, and things just took off from there.

I Is the novel about you?

AZ I grew up in a small town which is actually the one that Sally- the little girl in the book-

describes. But our families couldn't be more different. My father still runs his insurance firm and my mother's a full-time housewife. It was a lovely home life, and I definitely wasn't as brave as Sally is.

I The book's about Sally and her horse. Do you like horses?

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AZ I've always liked them, but I'd never owned one. But when I started writing the book, I

realized what a big part of the story they were going to become. It was fun visiting a stables to

see how you look after them properly. It's not really the kind of work I'd like to do though.

I What advice would you give young writers?

AZ Oh, I'd say, don't wait for the perfect time to start writing, but find some spare moments

every day to do just a little. Also, don't sit down and expect this beautiful stream of words to

flow -you have to be patient. I had to keep going back and changing things in my book until they

were right. But don't give up, because it's worth it in the end.
